Bush Care in Bidjigal Reserve, 2010.

The Bidjigal Reserve Trust Board recognises with thanks, the efforts of our volunteers.

The Blue Gum Creek bushcare group has made wonderful progress since its first day in April this year. Leader Ann Parks, members Irene, Michelle and Robert, and generous helpers have worked on removing weeds and planting suitable native plants along the group hank east of the

creek bank east of the new fire trail crossing.

Blue Gum Creek is normally a gentle stream but grows rapidly in steady rain, even if the rain is on the other side of the M2. This means the banks need protection from erosion. The shady creeklines in the reserve are popular roosting places for Powerful Owls, but the owls don't roost in the deciduous Acer negundo, an exotic species that has invaded the creeks from

street and garden plantings in neighbouring suburbs. Growing over the Acers and other trees



and shrubs along the creek were various weedy vines, especially balloon vine and honey-suckle. *Tradescantia* (aka Wandering Jew or Trad) covered the ground in several places.

The bushcare group has treated and removed vines including *Tradescantia*, balloon vine and honeysuckle, and woody weeds such as Privet, *Acer negundo*, and lantana. Herbaceous weeds are

also abundant and those treated include pavonia, crofton weed, and grasses.

To replace the weeds and

improve habitat and creek bank stability, over 65 trees, plants, shrubs and climbers have also been planted.

To assist with and supplement this group's work the Trust has recently won a grant to deal with the

woody weeds and weedy vines further up and down the creek and behind homes further up the hill. This grant includes training for more volunteers, so that more of the community can become skilled bush carers.

The group meets onsite (where the fire trail crosses Blue Gum creek on the new culvert) at 10am on the second Sunday of every month and welcomes assistance, so if you are interested contact Ann on 0428678209.

Bidjigal Treasure

Eastern Bentwing-bat (Miniopterus schreibersii oceanensis)



The Eastern Bentwing Bat has chocolate to reddish-brown fur on its back and slightly lighter coloured fur on its belly. It has a short snout and a high 'domed' head with short round ears. It weighs up to 20 grams, has a head and body length of about 6 cm and a wingspan of 30-35 cm.

Caves are the primary roosting habitat, but also use derelict storm-water tunnels, buildings and other man-made structures.

Weed Removal

The Trust has contracted Ecohort to carry out bush regeneration in the reserve. This has achieved a reduction in noxious and environmental weeds close to three residential neighbourhoods, as well as along the creek banks where our bushcare team is working. This work was funded by a noxious weeds grant from the LPMA and Trust funds.
